

10 Questions to Ask Memory Care Facilities

Question 1: What dementia-specific training do staff members receive, and how often is it updated?

Inquire about the type and frequency of dementia-specific training provided to staff. Regular updates to training programs are essential to incorporate the latest best practices. A commitment to continuous education reflects the facility's dedication to high-quality care.

Question 2: What is the staff-to-resident ratio, and how is care personalized for each resident's needs?

Question 3: What safety measures are in place to prevent wandering and ensure residents' security?

Question 7: What is included in the monthly fee, and are there additional costs for specific services?

Request a detailed breakdown of the monthly fees, including which services are covered and which may incur additional charges. Understanding the fee structure will help you assess affordability and plan for potential future expenses.

Question 8: How does the dining program accommodate residents with special dietary needs or preferences?

Ensure the dining program can cater to various dietary requirements, such as diabetic-friendly, low-sodium, or pureed diets. Ask about meal flexibility, dining assistance, and how the staff monitors residents' nutritional intake. Ask about dementia-friendly dining and how staff will help residents who can no longer feed themselves.

Question 9: Can you describe a typical day for a memory care resident?

Looking for a structured daily routine with a balance of activities, meals, rest periods, and personal care is beneficial for individuals with dementia. Ask for a sample schedule to understand how the community organizes residents' days.

Question 10: What is your approach to family involvement, and how are families kept informed about their loved one's well-being?

The best memory care facilities have a collaborative approach that encourages family participation and regular communication. Inquire about family meetings, updates, visitation policies, and support groups.
